11:15-11:45 a.m.	ULTIMATE A-SCANS: BIOMETRY TIPS & TECHNIQUES Laura Lee Hopkins, COMT, OCT-C, ROUB, OSC This lecture will cover a brief history of the IOL, the methods of measurement currently available, the types of formulas used, and formula application to each patient. The instructor will provide examples of proper and improper measurements. Participants will be shown how to identify accuracy on the data printed from the biometry measurements, and be given examples to aid in accurate measurements. 1:00-1:30 p.m.	THE OPHTHALMIC TECHNICIAN'S GUIDE TO DETECTING AND EVALUATING DOUBLE VISION <i>Kyle Arnoldi-Jolley COMT, CO</i> Double vision is one of the more common visual complaints that a patient brings to their ophthalmologist. Unfortunately, double vision does not always mean diplopia! The role of the technician begins with an in-depth interview to determine which symptoms the patient is experiencing, under what circumstances, and any associated findings. The technician's exam must also include a few additional steps including determination of the dominant eye and evaluation of fusion potential. This lecture will offer a step-by-step method for working up a new patient with symptoms of double vision.				
1:30-2:00 p.m.	NYSTAGMUS: A SIMPLIFIED APPROACH <i>Kyle Arnoldi-Jolley COMT, CO</i> Most eye care professionals find nystagmus intimidating. Even the most simple tests become complex when the eyes are constantly moving. To make things more difficult, some forms of nystagmus are associated with vision or life-threatening diseases. This lecture will attempt to demystify nystagmus and provide the technician with a logical and simplified way to work up the patient with nystagmus. The types of nystagmus that should raise a red flag will also be discussed.				
2:00-2:30 p.m.	COLOR VISION Craig Simms, BSc, COMT, ROUB, CDOS This course will present a case study of a family with a color deficiency. Using pseudoisochromatic plates, D-15, and the 100 hue, this color deficiency will be explored in one particular part of the family. This case study will illustrate how the different types of tests usually correlate to help determine the type and severity of the deficiency.

2:45-3:45 p.m.	BASICS OF OCULAR GENETICS FOR OPHTHALMIC TECHNICIANS John Lillvis, MD, PhD This course will review the basics of genetic eye disease as encountered in routine clinical practice. It will help the attendee understand basic modes of genetic inheritance and how to interpret pedigrees, as well as recognize some of the more common types of inherited eye disease. Basics of genetic testing, clinical management and imaging, and treatment will be discussed.
